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1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Your name is Page?

2 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

3 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Hi, (inaudible).

4 Nice to meet you (inaudible) police.

5 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: These guys want to  
6 talk to you for a minute. Grab a seat.

7 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: We got this  
8 affidavit. Did you write that?

9 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

10 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Did anybody promise  
11 you anything for writing that?

12 AMOS PAGE: Um, what you mean?

13 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Like did anybody  
14 promise that you'd receive something? Like, did  
15 they give you money? Did they promise to give you  
16 money? Did they promise that you would receive  
17 money or anything else for writing this?

18 AMOS PAGE: No, no money or nothing.

19 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: No? What did they  
20 promise you?

21 AMOS PAGE: Nothing. They said I wouldn't  
22 be in trouble for it.

23 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: You wouldn't be in  
24 trouble for it? Okay, they just said you wouldn't  
25 get in trouble.

1                    AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

2                    UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay, and that's  
3 true. That's true. You wouldn't get in trouble for  
4 saying something like this.

5                    What you wrote in here brought us, as the  
6 Denver Police, a lot of heartache and concern about  
7 what's going on in the Sheriff's Department and  
8 that's what we wanted to talk with you about today  
9 is, you know, you talk about one of the deputies  
10 drinking a lot vodka and selling marijuana and  
11 cigarettes and so I wanted to kind of hear it from  
12 you instead of just this -- this is only a couple  
13 pages, about what the heck was going on there.

14                   AMOS PAGE: He did. I mean -- everybody --  
15 I never related myself as a gang leader.

16                   UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

17                   AMOS PAGE: So, I just want that out there.  
18 But the circumstances in there may to appear  
19 differently, you know what I'm saying and some of my  
20 homies and some of the other people were -- and  
21 that's what -- he was drunk. He was wild. You  
22 know, that's what he was doing.

23                   And I don't know if it was because -- I  
24 don't know for what reason. I never seen anybody  
25 actually threaten him or -- you know what I'm saying

1     -- do anything like that to him to make him want to  
2     do that or whatever, but I guess it was just the  
3     (inaudible) he was in. That's just how it was. And  
4     now we don't have more to say than what it says in  
5     there.

6             UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, that doesn't  
7     say much. It just says -- I mean, you just kind of  
8     throw the bullet points out and it's only a couple  
9     pages.

10            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And that may not be  
11     what you said (inaudible).

12            AMOS PAGE: That's exactly what I said.

13            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: The attorney  
14     (inaudible).

15            AMOS PAGE: I was there when they typed it.  
16     I sat there and watched them type it. We sat here  
17     in this visitation room and I'm looking at the  
18     screen as he's typing and as I'm telling him, he's  
19     typing. That's what I'm saying.

20            I mean, there's nothing -- what is in there  
21     is true and accurate and I mean -- I don't mean to  
22     cause nobody no heartache, but it is what it is.

23            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Here's the deal.  
24     You know the Denver Police and Denver Sheriff's are  
25     two separate, basically, entities.

1 AMOS PAGE: Yes.

2 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: When we get  
3 accusations like this, we want to talk to the people  
4 who make those kind of accusations against the  
5 Sheriff's Department because we, as Denver Police  
6 Officers, we put the people in the jail.

7 We don't have anything to do with the jail,  
8 but we also want to make sure people are treated  
9 fairly. We're not just talking to you. I mean,  
10 we're talking to other people who didn't do  
11 affidavits. We're talking other people who are in  
12 the cells for quite some time and we're getting a  
13 lot of different viewpoints.

14 And I'll be honest with you, Amos, I mean,  
15 I'm being straight up with you. I mean, I don't  
16 even know what you're in here for to be quite honest  
17 with you. It doesn't really matter to me.

18 I mean -- I just want to make sure what  
19 you're reporting is true and accurate because we're  
20 not getting that from everybody. Do you understand  
21 what I'm saying?

22 AMOS PAGE: Like I said, it wasn't uh -- it  
23 was known, but it wasn't publicly known. There's  
24 only a few -- see, I don't --

25 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Now do you mean,

1       what wasn't known exactly?

2               AMOS PAGE:   About his actions.   I mean,  
3       everybody knew he was drunk.   You could smell it on  
4       him.   You know what I'm saying?   I mean, that's  
5       apparent.   But as far as the transactions would go  
6       and how he -- who he would meet on the street to do  
7       whatever and bring in whatever, all that wasn't  
8       know.   It was only known to a few top players.

9               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   Who knew?

10              AMOS PAGE:   I'm not going to say that.

11              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   Okay, you don't have  
12       to.   I'm not going to force you to say something you  
13       don't want to say.   I mean, obviously, it would help  
14       you in your story to give us names of other people,  
15       besides it's just Amos Page in here, who really kind  
16       of implicate yourself in a felony crime in that  
17       statement.

18              Okay?   I didn't sit here and give you  
19       Miranda.   You got that?

20              AMOS PAGE:   Yeah.

21              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   I mean, so that's  
22       not what I'm looking for, but you implicate yourself  
23       in a felony crime that happened in the jail for some  
24       lawyers -- and like I said, it would help you for us  
25       to know -- you say you know and very few knew --

1           AMOS PAGE: But it's not my business. I'm  
2 not a rat. It's not my business to tell what  
3 everybody else knew.

4           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: You're not  
5 (inaudible) putting somebody in jail on this stuff.  
6 I mean, we're not looking to put you in jail.

7           AMOS PAGE: Well, I know that. If they  
8 wanted to know -- if they wanted it to be known that  
9 they know, they would have let it be known because  
10 the lawyer went and talked to pretty much a lot of  
11 people that was involved. You know what I'm saying?

12           I mean, all I can say is, that is what it  
13 is. That's how old boy ended up getting assaulted.  
14 That's part of the reason -- I wouldn't say part of  
15 the reason behind it, but that's part of -- that's  
16 what stemmed -- he stemmed it all off. You know  
17 what I'm saying and I mean --

18           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And we're looking at  
19 kind of the big picture here, what's going on here.  
20 You say he brings stuff in. Rumer, is that who  
21 we're talking about?

22           AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

23           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: What do you mean by  
24 "brought stuff in"?

25           AMOS PAGE: Cigarettes, chewing tobacco, I

1 mean, he brought it in.

2 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay. (Inaudible)  
3 talking to her about marijuana, about hooch. We  
4 went to the jail. I mean, we're right across the  
5 street. So we went and looked at the pods and  
6 stuff.

7 Rumer is not the only deputy in there.  
8 They work 12-hour shifts so they're there three days  
9 a week.

10 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

11 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So, you specifically  
12 state Rumer, but he's only there three days a week.  
13 How does all that play into it?

14 AMOS PAGE: I mean, he was there three days  
15 a week, but he's working more than three days a week  
16 too.

17 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Working some  
18 overtime too?

19 AMOS PAGE: Yeah. I mean, he wasn't there  
20 just three days, cut and dry and gone. He was there  
21 -- he was our main pod officer for the bulk of the  
22 day, in the morning until mid-day afternoon. He was  
23 our officer.

24 The other officer he came in at -- what was  
25 it two?



1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Yeah.

2 AMOS PAGE: He came in at two or three, but  
3 we locked down at nine. So he may be there for 12  
4 hours, but we're not in physical contact with him  
5 for those whole 12 hours. Do you see what I'm  
6 saying? We lock down at 9:00. We're --

7 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: 9:00 p.m., you're  
8 locked down?

9 AMOS PAGE: Yeah. Yeah, we're in our cell  
10 at 9:00.

11 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And he until -- from  
12 when to when was he working?

13 AMOS PAGE: He worked from, what, 5:30 to  
14 change or 6:00 till change. He was there right  
15 after breakfast and he wouldn't leave until shift  
16 change.

17 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Which is 6 p.m.?

18 AMOS PAGE: No, shift change at 2 p.m. -- 2  
19 or 3 p.m. I really don't -- I've been here for a  
20 long time. I really don't remember the details.

21 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right, a few years  
22 ago, I get that (inaudible).

23 AMOS PAGE: So but he was there and we had  
24 the most contact with him for the majority part of  
25 the day because we're out -- for that chunk that

1 he's there we're out the most.

2 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's when you were  
3 out doing your thing and being out in the pod.

4 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, we're out in the pod and  
5 playing games, on the phone, in the yard, whatever.  
6 That's when we're out there.

7 When the nightshift comes on from 3 to 9,  
8 we're not really out because we go lock down for  
9 chow. We come back out after chow, which is like  
10 6:30 or 7 and then we're out only to 9:00.

11 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's your down  
12 time.

13 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, and then we're back  
14 locked down.

15 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So Rumer would have  
16 -- I mean there's other deputies there, so we saw  
17 three or four deputies. Why do you think it was no  
18 other deputies saw that Rumer was drunk?

19 AMOS PAGE: I mean, do you really think  
20 that they're going to put it on their own  
21 colleagues?

22 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: I would. I mean,  
23 I've been a cop for 30 years. I would.

24 AMOS PAGE: Well, you've got more integrity  
25 than a lot of people. You know what I'm saying? I

1 don't know -- I don't know -- I don't what they  
2 said. I don't know why they said what they said.

3 All I'm saying is what I seen, what I know.  
4 That's it. I can't say what other people know or  
5 what other people seen or why he said this and  
6 didn't say this. I don't know. You know, it is  
7 what it is.

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And you talk about  
9 in your statement that there's marijuana and there  
10 was smoking cigarettes. He brought cigarettes in.  
11 (Inaudible) smoking a lot?

12 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

13 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: No other sheriff saw  
14 that or do you think other sheriffs --

15 AMOS PAGE: People got caught for smoking  
16 all the time.

17 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

18 AMOS PAGE: People got caught for smoking.  
19 People got caught for hooch. People got caught all  
20 the time. There's a mandatory -- they had to do a  
21 certain amount of cell shakedowns per shift.

22 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right.

23 AMOS PAGE: And there was hooch being made.  
24 There's only six cells in a pod.

25 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right.

1           AMOS PAGE: So in that pod there was --  
2   let's say, 16 (inaudible). So you figure each cell  
3   holds eight men. They're not going to put us all in  
4   the same cells.

5           There's almost a Blood in every cell -- one  
6   or two Bloods in every cell. You know what I'm  
7   saying? And for my homies -- for my little homies  
8   for what I know, I know for a fact that there was  
9   hooch sells when he went in there and starts to  
10   sell. I knew for a fact.

11          UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Just Rumer or did  
12   other deputies (inaudible)?

13          AMOS PAGE: When other -- see, the other  
14   officers -- there was no other officers like that.  
15   You know what I'm saying? They was more so like by  
16   the book. You know what I'm saying? They wouldn't  
17   try other officers like that. You know what I'm  
18   saying?

19          So, when they come on, all their stuff gets  
20   put up and hid. And the chair porters (?) hid the  
21   shit where they hid it and once they leave, it gets  
22   brought back out and (inaudible) or whatever.

23          UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: You're saying when  
24   the other deputies would do the cell -- well,  
25   shakeout, they just didn't find it?

1 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, they didn't find it.

2 Yeah.

3 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So you also talk  
4 about how you arranged a buy for Rumer to get  
5 marijuana.

6 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

7 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Explain that because  
8 I just don't understand exactly what you're talking  
9 about.

10 AMOS PAGE: He -- he -- he approached me  
11 and asked me if I knew (inaudible) marijuana. I  
12 said, yeah. I said, that's what I do. I said, how  
13 much do you want? You tell me. I said, don't trip.  
14 Call this number. Tell them I sent you. Boom.  
15 Don't wear none of your cop shit and you're good.

16 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Do you know where he  
17 went to get the stuff?

18 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, I know where he went to  
19 get it.

20 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Can you tell us  
21 where he went to get it?

22 AMOS PAGE: I'm not -- I'm not --

23 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Whenever one is  
24 legal in Denver now, so I really don't care about  
25 it.

1           AMOS PAGE: Okay, but I'm not -- it's not  
2   -- I'm not -- whatever -- this is me talking. This  
3   is just me. I'm not putting nobody else in what I'm  
4   doing or what I'm saying. It's just me. If you  
5   want to know something, I'm going to let you know  
6   about what I know and what I did.

7           I'm not going to let you know about what  
8   other people did because that's not my job.

9           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Who can we talk to  
10   to verify Rumer got dope?

11          AMOS PAGE: I could have my lawyers go -- I  
12   could have my lawyers go talk to somebody. If they  
13   can get an affidavit, you can talk to them or  
14   whatever. Or if they can be present, you could talk  
15   to them, but I'm not -- I'll ask them if they want  
16   to talk to you.

17          I'm not about to send you to somebody  
18   blindly without them knowing that you're coming to  
19   talk to them or without my lawyers notifying them  
20   that you're coming to talk to them. I'm not going  
21   to get down like that.

22          UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's Sergeant  
23   (inaudible). I'll give you a card.

24          AMOS PAGE: If that's how you guys want  
25   this to be done, that's not a problem.

1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Let me ask you this  
2 question. So you're talking -- you say "my lawyer",  
3 so are you talking about the lawyers that got your  
4 affidavit? Is that who you are talking about?

5 AMOS PAGE: No, not them -- my lawyers.

6 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Other lawyers, your  
7 lawyers.

8 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

9 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Let me ask you a  
10 question about these lawyers. When you did an  
11 affidavit for them, basically in regards to a party  
12 who you halfway admit to assaulting, what was the  
13 conversation of how they got you to talk about what  
14 happened with -- is it Jamal, Brian?

15 SERGEANT COTTER: Jamal.

16 AMOS PAGE: It was -- I had knew that Jamal  
17 was suing or whatever he was doing with the  
18 sheriff's department. I knew that before I left the  
19 county jail.

20 When they came -- when they brought it up,  
21 me and my case manager both sat there and that's the  
22 first thing that (inaudible) to my mind was about  
23 this lawsuit. They didn't come out right away with  
24 the lawsuit. They came out asking about the assault  
25 and who was involved in the assault and who was

1       there.

2                   And like I told you all, I stated my part.

3       It's not my job to implicate anybody else in  
4       anything but I stated what I did regardless or  
5       whatever. You know what I'm saying? And then they  
6       started the suit and about Rumer because they was  
7       like well, how did this happen?

8                   If you guys are locked down and you guys  
9       are in your cell -- there's only six cells. The  
10      place where the desk is at in the pod, it's not hard  
11      to see all six cells. You know what I'm saying?  
12      They put that desk there so they got a good visual  
13      of all six cells.

14                  So if this is going on in these six cells  
15      during a shift change, where was Rumer at? You know  
16      what I'm saying?

17                  UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: (Inaudible) through  
18      that whole thing.

19                  AMOS PAGE: Was he upstairs? Was he  
20      downstairs? Was he at the desk? Where was he at?  
21      So that's how the whole thing got brought up? Was  
22      he in cahoots? Did he know about it?

23                  And then that's how that all -- that's how  
24      the whole situation with Rumer came up anyway. They  
25      never came up here and just came out like well, did



1 Rumer do this or try to coerce me into saying  
2 anything about Rumer? It was never nothing like  
3 that. You know what I'm saying?

4 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, let me ask you  
5 this because you're not answering a lot of my  
6 questions. That's fine. That's your choice. When  
7 I ask questions about who and what, you don't want  
8 to answer that. That's fine. That's your choice.

9 Why would you talk to lawyers and implicate  
10 yourself in an assault on somebody? I guess what  
11 I'm not understanding why you would talk about what  
12 you did to Jamal with some lawyers. I mean, why  
13 would you do that, when you're not telling me some  
14 stuff, which is fine. Like I said, why would you do  
15 that with them?

16 AMOS PAGE: Because they're asking me what  
17 my involvement in the situation was. That's fine.  
18 I said what my involvement in the situation was.  
19 And I'm doing that with you here now.

20 There's no difference, but like I said  
21 before, it's not my job to sit here and implicate  
22 anybody in anything. If they wanted to talk to you  
23 all -- like you guys said you guys want to talk to  
24 other people, if they want to tell you this or that,  
25 then they'll tell you that.

1           You know what I'm saying? It's not my job  
2   to tell you what their part was. It's their job to  
3   tell you what they're part was. This is for me.  
4   It's not for nobody else.

5           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right. And we're  
6   trying to add to your credibility by finding other  
7   people and verifying or confirm what you're saying  
8   to us. Do you understand what I'm saying?

9           I mean, a lot of people say things to us in  
10  the 30 years I've been doing this that -- some  
11  people tell the truth, some people lie. But I don't  
12  know you and you don't me.

13          AMOS PAGE: I imagine for that reason alone  
14  I don't feel the need to verify myself. It is what  
15  it is. Whatever has to happen, I'll tell whoever  
16  the same thing.

17          UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Part of what you say  
18  that I think is really interesting to me and that I  
19  really want to know the answer to, is this a problem  
20  with Rumer? Was Rumer doing things wrong in the  
21  jail or is this a problem with the jail? Was the  
22  jail doing things wrong? Like, are people safe in  
23  that jail?

24          AMOS PAGE: Yes, people are safe in the  
25  jail. It was never -- I mean they got real, real

1     good people there, Sergeant (inaudible), Captain  
2     Roman. You know what I'm saying, they got good  
3     people there.

4             And when the situation did happen, they  
5     responded and did what they're supposed to do. It  
6     wasn't nobody trying to cover up anything or cover  
7     what happened.

8             So the problem -- I never -- not one time  
9     have I ever said anything was wrong with the jail.

10            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, you allude to  
11     it. When I tell you that you got five, six pages of  
12     kind of bullet points, I want to clarify that.

13            AMOS PAGE: If you want to ask that, I can  
14     understand that.

15            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Because you talk  
16     about them making hooch, like lots of it, like 20  
17     gallons a week.

18            AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

19            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: I'm struggling,  
20     because I've done home brewing before, not jail  
21     style, but home stuff and it puts off an odor.

22            And I'm struggling, if we walk away with  
23     the assumption that Rumer was doing bad stuff, we  
24     can do that. But Rumer is not there 24 hours a day  
25     and he's not there seven days a week, so you're

1     talking about this 20-gallon a week production  
2     facility and I'm struggling to figure out how is it  
3     that somebody else, other than Rumer, didn't notice.

4             AMOS PAGE:   Picture this.   See that trash  
5     can.

6             UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   Uh-huh.

7             AMOS PAGE:   If you go into rooms in the  
8     Denver County, there are 5-gallon trash cans just  
9     like that.   Okay?   Like I said before, there was --  
10    and this is on the low end -- 16 of my homies in  
11    this pod and I know for a fact that four of six  
12    rooms there was hooch going.

13            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   Okay.

14            AMOS PAGE:   So it takes a week to make a  
15    nice batch of hooch.   No, he wasn't bringing us  
16    yeast, no, he wasn't bringing us sugar, nothing like  
17    that, no.   But you can acquire all the stuff to make  
18    the hooch in there.   The water was hot enough.

19            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   But nobody else  
20    noticed it when they (inaudible) the cell that this  
21    bucket was a little heavier than a normal bucket.

22            AMOS PAGE:   It's not going to be kept in a  
23    bucket.

24            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:   That trash can.

25            AMOS PAGE:   Yeah, it's not going to be kept

1       -- we are criminals.  It's not going to be in that  
2       bucket.  You know what I'm saying?

3               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  Okay.

4               AMOS PAGE:  I mean, there's chair porters,  
5       there's people that got access to cleaning closets,  
6       to storage closets.  There's people that -- it's not  
7       going to get kept there.  You know what I'm saying?

8               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  Okay.

9               AMOS PAGE:  It was made there and for the  
10       majority of the time it was stored there.  And it  
11       was kept hot with the hot bottles in the bottom and  
12       it wasn't just in the trash can.  It was in a bag  
13       sealed up.  You know what I'm saying?  And the only  
14       time we would burp it is when Rumer was there.  You  
15       know what I'm saying?

16               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  Okay, because it was  
17       all sealed up.

18               AMOS PAGE:  Exactly.  Or if we had to burp  
19       it because the vat was going to explode, which  
20       sometimes it did explode.  And just because we're in  
21       an 8-man cell or in a county jail cell it doesn't  
22       mean that we can't cover up the odor.

23               I mean, there's many, many, many things  
24       that you can use to cover up that odor.  You know  
25       what I'm saying.  Baby powder, foot absorb, there's

1 a lot of things you can use and put in the air to  
2 cover up that odor, soap, deodorant, shampoo. I  
3 mean the list goes on. You know what I'm saying?

4 So when I said 20-gallons a week, that's  
5 accurate. A 5-gallon trash can, (inaudible) trash  
6 can is really not that much if you look at it. You  
7 know what I'm saying?

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Mm-hmm.

9 AMOS PAGE: And you guys know, you can buy  
10 sodas in there and pop tokens. You buy sodas,  
11 that's how you distribute it.

12 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Now you can't smoke  
13 in the jail though, right? So how is it -- I'm  
14 struggling with -- he brings you the cigarettes and  
15 you're selling them around. Like, are you guys just  
16 smoking when he's around or --

17 AMOS PAGE: I mean, you smoke when he's  
18 around, smoke during the nighttime lie down, because  
19 -- now this is a problem -- well, it's not a problem  
20 but this could be a safety concern.

21 When the lights go off in the room, right,  
22 you guys have been in the pod. You've seen the big  
23 windows. Those big windows cast such a glare off of  
24 the window that you're not going to be able to see  
25 in the window unless you get on the window. You

1 know what I'm saying?

2 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right, right. We  
3 saw that.

4 AMOS PAGE: So, I mean -- now, that might  
5 be a problem with (inaudible). You know what I'm  
6 saying? But that's not directly with the personnel  
7 that's running the jail.

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: (Inaudible).

9 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, that's it. I mean, so  
10 there's other times to smoke. Like I said, there's  
11 other ways to cover up the smell. You put the  
12 (inaudible) curtain up because you know where the  
13 bathroom is at in there. You tie the (inaudible)  
14 curtain up. You get behind there. Whoever -- all  
15 you all get behind there. You blow the smoke down  
16 the toilet and flush the toilet.

17 The toilet (inaudible) automatic shutoff.  
18 You can flush the toilet as many times as you want.  
19 You know what I'm saying? So you smoke, blow, push  
20 it in the toilet.

21 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So when you talk  
22 about Rumer bringing stuff in like marijuana, is  
23 that all he brought in was marijuana?

24 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

25 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That was the drug

1 (inaudible) thing?

2 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

3 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: How many times did  
4 he do that?

5 AMOS PAGE: A couple.

6 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's it?

7 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Who did he give it  
9 to? Just you?

10 AMOS PAGE: Nah.

11 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And you're not going  
12 to tell me who else he gave it to?

13 AMOS PAGE: Nah.

14 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay. So --

15 AMOS PAGE: He didn't give it -- he didn't  
16 give anything -- he didn't give nothing but the  
17 cigarettes, tobacco directly to anybody, but he  
18 would leave it accessible. He would never just come  
19 and hand you nothing.

20 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right.

21 AMOS PAGE: You know what I'm saying? But  
22 he would leave it accessible, like with the chew.  
23 He would never hand, say, me, a can a chew. But he  
24 would -- okay, you know what I'm saying, but he  
25 would just put the whole can in the trash.



1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: I got you. So how  
2 would he get paid?

3 AMOS PAGE: (Inaudible) the street.

4 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

5 AMOS PAGE: On the street. You meet  
6 somebody and they pay him or you buy 'em pop tokens.  
7 You know what I'm saying?

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So if he got paid on  
9 the street from a person he bought this from, but  
10 you said it was only a couple times. I'm talking  
11 marijuana.

12 AMOS PAGE: Oh, the marijuana, yeah, he  
13 would get paid on the street.

14 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: And those people  
15 (inaudible).

16 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

17 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Those are your  
18 (inaudible) basically.

19 AMOS PAGE: Those are the people  
20 (inaudible) a couple of people.

21 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay. All right.  
22 Would you say you were one of Rumer's favorites?

23 AMOS PAGE: (No response.)

24 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Did he favor you?

25 AMOS PAGE: Uh, he was -- see, I don't know

1 if it was favor or if it was intimidation. I don't  
2 what it was. I don't know if he was intimidated by  
3 me or if was he really liked me because I really  
4 kept -- I kept the homies at bay. I kept everything  
5 cool. There was issues. There was fights. There  
6 was whatever, but I kept it as far as to a minimum  
7 as I could. You know what I'm saying?

8 So maybe he liked that or maybe he seen --  
9 maybe he seen -- see, I don't know. I can't -- I  
10 don't want to say nothing like that. I don't know.  
11 I don't know if I was a favorite or not.

12 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Do you think -- so  
13 what Sergeant Connor said, basically it wasn't a  
14 jail issue. It was a Rumer issue.

15 AMOS PAGE: No, it was never a jail issue.

16 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: (Inaudible) jail.  
17 (Inaudible).

18 AMOS PAGE: Only people who fear for their  
19 lives in that jail is chomos (sic), check-ins  
20 (phonetic) and snitches. That's it. It's a high  
21 gang environment. It's Denver. There's a lot of  
22 gang members.

23 And in a lot of pods the way they try to  
24 keep it calm is by putting a lot of people together,  
25 but at the same time intermixing a little bit of

1 other people. That way there's one Blood over here  
2 and 13 Crips.

3 So the Bloods ain't going to mess with this  
4 Crip because if they mess with this Crip, then these  
5 Crips will jump just one Blood over here. You know  
6 what I'm saying.

7 And it was kind of clever how they situated  
8 that. But, I mean, as far as general welfare, no,  
9 it's not a jail issue -- it's not.

10 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So would you say  
11 most of the sheriffs were pretty up and up?

12 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

13 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay, at their job?

14 AMOS PAGE: Most all the sheriffs. I  
15 couldn't stand a lot of the sheriffs because they  
16 were always on me because they didn't let -- they  
17 didn't let my reputation or who people saw me as  
18 deter anything.

19 They were still on me like -- you know what  
20 I'm saying -- they knew I was a gang leader. I was  
21 escorted all the way to religious services, escorted  
22 back, escorted to medical, escorted -- you know what  
23 I'm saying? Like some people they just send you  
24 down a hallway. Not me.

25 I'm escorted to there, escorted back.

1       There was no time for me to mingle, send messages,  
2       none of that. There wasn't having none of that.

3               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: You talked a little  
4       bit about pornography, that Rumer supplied  
5       pornography.

6               AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

7               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Where did he get  
8       that from; do you know?

9               AMOS PAGE: We see him -- the reason we  
10      caught him on pornography because we be on the  
11      basketball court, shooting baskets and pull-ups and  
12      we look on the screen and there would be porn on the  
13      screen. You know what I'm saying?

14              So I guess he could have been blackmailed.  
15      I never (inaudible) with pornography, but after a  
16      while, me, being who I was, I started getting the  
17      pornography.

18              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Is it  
19      computer-generated or was it magazines, pictures  
20      torn out?

21              AMOS PAGE: It was computer-generated.

22              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So it was like what  
23      he printed off his computer that he --

24              AMOS PAGE: Oh, no, no. What he was  
25      watching when we was in there was on the computer.

1 But what he brought in was -- I mean, some of it was  
2 magazines. A lot of it was magazines. Some of it  
3 was pronounced. Some of it was photos. You know  
4 what I'm saying? But you get those off the Internet  
5 and print them out too. That's what we get here.

6 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: But you never saw  
7 him printing them at the jail.

8 AMOS PAGE: No. Oh, no.

9 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: When he would bring  
10 this stuff in, would he -- would you be the  
11 (inaudible) person or several people would be  
12 (inaudible)?

13 AMOS PAGE: Several people. It depends on  
14 who made that initial contact on whatever. Like I  
15 said, there was a lot of hot players in there. So  
16 whoever made that initial contact on whatever it  
17 was, they would be the (inaudible) person. Boom.

18 Now, yes, I was a chair porter. You know  
19 what I'm saying? So at times I did make stuff  
20 accessible for other people to do. You know what  
21 I'm saying? I don't know if you guys know, but the  
22 guards (inaudible) computer. They go around and do  
23 a little check. That's pretty much it.

24 Chair porter serve dinner, clean up after  
25 dinner, clean up after the (inaudible) do all that.

1     You know what I'm saying? Yeah, my job was trash,  
2     (inaudible) and phones.

3             UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So how is a  
4     transaction done (inaudible)? Was there a certain  
5     method?

6             AMOS PAGE: A lot -- I mean, when i got it,  
7     I got it off the trash. You know what I'm saying?  
8     I would sit there and I would be sitting at the  
9     table playing dominos or playing poker and I'd look  
10    up and I'd see the magazine or I'd see a page  
11    (inaudible) eyes and he'll throw it in the trash.

12            So before shift change, I'll go get the  
13    trash. And when I go out to the (inaudible) port to  
14    put the trash out there, boom, I'll pop the bag,  
15    stuff it, you know what I'm saying, and go back to  
16    my room. Or I go in the multipurpose room and put  
17    it in my sock, put it in my shoe and go back in the  
18    pod.

19            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: After the assault  
20    happened, did things change?

21            AMOS PAGE: After the assault happened, I  
22    was gone. They took me out of the loop. They  
23    pretty much segregated me. They had me in the hole.  
24    (Inaudible).

25            UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: I thought you said

1       they didn't get you in no trouble.

2               AMOS PAGE: I didn't get no -- I was in  
3       trouble -- I was (inaudible) investigation. And  
4       that's what I'm saying, it wasn't a jail. All the  
5       procedures and everything (inaudible). You know  
6       what I'm saying because nobody see nothing.

7               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right.

8               AMOS PAGE: So whatever happened in that  
9       room, only those people in that room knew what  
10      happened. You know what I'm saying? So when they  
11      came in, they took us all. They took the whole  
12      room. They took everybody to the hole.

13              Two people was in court at trial but the  
14      other six of us, they took us all. You know what  
15      I'm saying? We was all in the hole in their  
16      investigation.

17              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

18              AMOS PAGE: And then one of the guys that  
19      did the assault, he got charged with it and then  
20      they let us all out, but they wouldn't put me back  
21      with my homies.

22              Now, why, I didn't know. I never made a  
23      funk about it. You know what I'm saying? But they  
24      had separated me and put me all the way on the other  
25      side of the jail with nothing but Crips. So now I

1 was the odd man out.

2 So I was really out of loop. You know what  
3 I'm saying? Everything (inaudible) came to me. I  
4 couldn't go out. I never left my pod. I went to  
5 court and then I got here.

6 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay. All right.  
7 Brent?

8 BRENT: I don't think I have anything else.

9 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: (Inaudible)?

10 AMOS PAGE: No, I mean, I'm glad you all  
11 clarified that about the (inaudible). It was never  
12 -- it was never a security issue with the jail. It  
13 was never that. All the other officers did their  
14 searches -- strip searches, pat-downs, shake the  
15 room down -- I mean, really shake it down. You know  
16 what I'm saying?

17 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: How often would they  
18 shake it down?

19 AMOS PAGE: They picked -- I think they did  
20 two rooms a shift. So every two days every room  
21 would get hit. You know what I'm saying? They do  
22 four rooms, next day they do four rooms. There's  
23 only six rooms in a pod. So sometimes your room  
24 would get hit back to back. You know what I'm  
25 saying?



1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Did they ever find  
2 hooch?

3 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, they found hootch.

4 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

5 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, they found hootch a lot  
6 of times.

7 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Did they?

8 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, they found -- and don't  
9 be mistaken by this. I was in county jail for 310  
10 days. So this is not just over a two to three-month  
11 period. This is over that whole span of time and  
12 that whole span of time within the last -- except  
13 for the last 45 days, I was in the same pod. I was  
14 in 3-A until I got moved to 3-F.

15 So within that whole span of time, this has  
16 taken place. This has not taken place just by six  
17 months or nothing like that. You know what I'm  
18 saying?

19 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So it wasn't  
20 isolated?

21 AMOS PAGE: No, no, no. It seems like a  
22 lot and it is, but it's over time. This didn't just  
23 happen just boom, boom, boom, boom. You know what  
24 I'm saying? But it was never a thing with the jail.

25 I mean, I'm a known gang member and I've

1        never felt unsafe. You know, they always -- I don't  
2        know. The management and a lot of the sheriffs,  
3        they do do their job. But like with anything  
4        there's a few that's going to be off grid, you know?

5                UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Right.

6                AMOS PAGE: In that instance when I was  
7        there, Rumer was the only one that I knew of that  
8        was even -- that was not on key. So I would never  
9        say that it was the jail. I'll never go along with  
10       it was the jail's issue or with the jail itself or  
11       with the sheriff's department itself.

12               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

13               AMOS PAGE: It was an isolated incident  
14       with an isolated officer, that was it, or sheriff.

15               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Help me get this.  
16       Because the time -- by the time people are starting  
17       to ask you about this and you're out of Denver,  
18       right?

19               AMOS PAGE: Mm-hmm.

20               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So you even said  
21       that you were already here. So you've been through  
22       (inaudible) been convicted, you've done all your  
23       court stuff and now you've gotten transported all  
24       the way out here.

25               We have talked to you a lot about a lot of

1 people that you don't want to tell us about. What  
2 makes you want to tell us about Rumer? What makes  
3 you want to tell people about Rumer?

4 This was like almost three years ago, you  
5 know, two years ago when you make the first  
6 statements about this. Like, what is it that got  
7 you so interested that you're like, I got to tell  
8 people about (inaudible)?

9 AMOS PAGE: Because it's fucked up what it  
10 did. It's fucked up that --

11 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: But you won. I  
12 mean, as fucked up as it is, you were a winner.

13 AMOS PAGE: It's not about me. I still got  
14 a conscience though. Yeah, I'm a gangster. Don't  
15 get it wrong. You know what I'm saying, I am a  
16 gangster, but at the same time I don't believe in  
17 innocent bystanders.

18 And to be honest, Jamal was an innocent  
19 bystander. You know what I'm saying? He was caught  
20 up in something. He didn't know what.

21 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Yeah, but in the  
22 midst of this, I mean, you implicate yourself in  
23 what Jamal did or what happened to Jamal. And not  
24 just Jamal, but you (inaudible).

25 AMOS PAGE: How did I implicate myself in

1       Jamal?

2                   UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  You talk about the  
3       hot water cups.  I mean, I'm just talking from your  
4       statement.  From your statement alone, you put  
5       yourself right in the mix of it.  You say, in your  
6       statement, I observed what happened to Jamal.

7                   AMOS PAGE:  Yeah.

8                   UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  At no point did you  
9       do anything to protect Jamal, not according to your  
10      statement.

11                  AMOS PAGE:  No, it's not my job to protect  
12      Jamal.  It's the sheriff's department.  It's the  
13      sheriff's (inaudible).

14                  UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  But you watched --  
15      you watched what happen.  And not just Jamal, but  
16      you talk about giving pumpkin heads to other people.

17                  AMOS PAGE:  That's not -- that's part of my  
18      lifestyle.  I'm a gangster.  That's what we do.  
19      (Inaudible) and when one of my little homies is out  
20      of line, they (inaudible) get a pumpkin head,  
21      regardless, and I'm never going to deny that.  I  
22      don't care where I'm at, here, DRDC, Limon, the  
23      streets, wherever I'm at they're going to get a  
24      pumpkin head if they get out of line.  I'm going to  
25      get my head busted if I get out of line.

1           So that there is a whole separate issue.

2       Now, if you want to go to the gang issue, that's a  
3       whole different issue.

4           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  No, no --

5           AMOS PAGE:  The shit with Jamal, yeah, I  
6       observed it.  (Inaudible) because at the time I did  
7       feel he was out of line.  Two, he's not from my  
8       hood.  I have no ties to him.  Three, I'm not going  
9       to get killed for defending somebody I have nothing  
10      to do with.

11           It's a lifestyle that unless you're a part  
12      of you really wouldn't understand.

13           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  Well, (inaudible).

14           AMOS PAGE:  I'm not going to be part of --  
15      there's been times in all types of facilities where  
16      I see somebody getting stomped out on the walkway or  
17      getting hit with a weight or whatever and I walk  
18      right past him.  It doesn't have nothing to do with  
19      me.

20           I'm not going to endanger myself to protect  
21      somebody else that has nothing to do with me.  Now  
22      if that's my homie, I (inaudible).

23           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER:  That's the piece  
24      that I'm struggling with is you're not going to get  
25      anything out of this by talking about Rumer.

1           The only thing you did, you told about  
2   Rumer, but you also told about yourself. I mean,  
3   you call it pumpkin head and that's part of what you  
4   do as a gangster and what have you, but we call it  
5   assault. And that's 9 News would call it and that's  
6   what the jail would call it is assault.

7           So you set yourself up. Like you basically  
8   admit to a host of crimes in there all because  
9   you're trying to tell about Rumer. And so that's  
10   why I'm struggling. What makes you want to take  
11   that step and say, not only -- not only did I see  
12   stuff happen but I want to talk about what I did  
13   also. You basically brought a lot of stuff on to  
14   yourself.

15           AMOS PAGE: I do feel bad. I feel bad for  
16   what happened to Jamal now. Then I didn't get a  
17   fuck. I didn't. Now I feel bad. It was wrong.

18           UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: I mean, to me --

19           AMOS PAGE: I have a conscience. I did  
20   wrong. It shouldn't happen to nobody and I felt bad  
21   that it happened to him. That's why I told you I  
22   don't have no problem telling what I did.

23           I say what I did or the part that I held  
24   with all this, but I'm not going to implicate  
25   everybody else because I don't know -- I don't know

1     how they was feeling when it happened. But I know  
2     now, after I've had three, four years to think about  
3     it, it's not right. I feel bad. I feel bad. And I  
4     fucked up.

5             You know what I'm saying? Now I'm a little  
6     older, a little more mature. Yeah, I'm still fully  
7     involved in gang, but I do see stuff a lot  
8     differently. You know what I'm saying?

9             Back then I was just young and wild and  
10    really didn't care. I'm looking at all this time.  
11    You know what I'm saying? It's a whole different  
12    psychological mind trick.

13            Now, I mean, it's messed up, man. It is  
14    messed up, you know. I mean, if I could go back and  
15    change it as of now, I would. I wouldn't allow that  
16    to happen to Jamal. But at the same time, at that  
17    point of time in my life, I felt -- I shouldn't say  
18    justified, but he was in the wrong.

19            And the reason for me coming out on Rumer  
20    is because he was in the wrong too. It's his job to  
21    make sure everybody in that pod is safe. That's  
22    what his job description is. That's what his duties  
23    are.

24            So the fact that he turned a blind eye or  
25    made himself unavailable, that's messed up,

1       regardless of what intimidation factor he's  
2       experiencing or regardless of how he feels about  
3       this or whatever -- or whatever monetary he's  
4       gaining from doing, whatever, it's still wrong and  
5       that's why I came out on him.

6               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, let me ask you  
7       one question then. If the attorneys wouldn't have  
8       asked (inaudible).

9               AMOS PAGE: I had thought about it. I had  
10      thought about it and I had talked to my girl and my  
11      sister and I mean, I don't know, I thought about it.  
12      But I thought about the trouble I was getting into  
13      too, you know, but at the end of the day, wrong is  
14      wrong and right is right.

15              I don't know. I really don't know. I  
16      mean, it did cross my mind. I knew how to do it.  
17      You know what I'm saying? I don't know them type of  
18      lawyers. I know criminal lawyers. You know what  
19      I'm saying? So, I really didn't know -- I didn't  
20      have no contact with Jamal. So I didn't really know  
21      what he was doing. I heard before I left the county  
22      that he was suing them. You know what I'm saying?

23              But I really didn't know the logistics or  
24      how far along he was. I don't know nothing about  
25      him. I don't know nothing about no (inaudible).



1       You know what I'm saying? I know about streets.

2               UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Page, let me tell  
3       you where you're headed with this because you just  
4       put an affidavit in the federal court. And if the  
5       city challenges, because this is a lawsuit between  
6       Hunter and the City and County of Denver and Deputy  
7       Rumer.

8               So if people don't plea bargain this, for  
9       lack of a better phrase, if they don't make an  
10      agreement about it, then we end up in trial. And  
11      you statement puts you on the stand.

12              AMOS PAGE: That's cool. I'll stand by  
13      everything I said.

14              UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Well, but again, if  
15      you make that -- if you say this or more than this  
16      on the federal stand, you're subjecting yourself to  
17      a criminal -- a felony criminal charge for what  
18      happened to Jamal because that's what that attorney  
19      came here to talk to you about.

20              They came here to talk to you because in  
21      the Denver Police criminal investigation you talk  
22      about talking with Detective Medina. When he does  
23      his investigation, everything kind of pointed at  
24      you.

25              Now they decided not to file criminal

1 charges at that time, but the statute of limitations  
2 hasn't run yet. So you end up putting yourself on  
3 the federal stand and being subject to  
4 cross-examination by two different attorneys on two  
5 different sides.

6 And while the topic isn't you, everything  
7 you say could be used against you. And that  
8 affidavit is just the start of a slippery slope. Do  
9 you get that? Did you get that when they had you  
10 write that?

11 AMOS PAGE: No. I signed it. I signed  
12 another paper. I didn't do (inaudible).

13 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Let me show what it  
14 says because you were pretty clear that you were  
15 there, sitting there.

16 I swear under the following that's it true  
17 and correct. When you do an affidavit in federal  
18 court and you sign it -- when you do an affidavit  
19 like this and it's thrown into the federal system,  
20 this is you saying it --

21 AMOS PAGE: I know that.

22 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: -- which means you  
23 can't undo this.

24 AMOS PAGE: Yeah, I know that.

25 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: This isn't just

1 writing on a statement for a police officer. This  
2 is way more serious.

3 AMOS PAGE: I signed it -- uh, I signed  
4 another paper. That's not all I did with them.

5 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: That's not all you  
6 did. What do you mean, you signed --

7 AMOS PAGE: No, I signed another paper. I  
8 signed -- uh, I can't remember what it's called. I  
9 got a copy of it in my unit though.

10 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: What was it about,  
11 do you remember that?

12 AMOS PAGE: It was about me not being  
13 persecuted for it.

14 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Some civil attorney  
15 can't promise you that the district attorney of  
16 Denver won't file charges against you.

17 AMOS PAGE: Well, that's what I signed and  
18 that's the reason why I gave my statement.

19 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So did this civil  
20 attorney promise you that you wouldn't be prosecuted  
21 for making these statements?

22 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

23 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: So there was a  
24 promise that was made?

25 AMOS PAGE: It was an agreement.

1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Because I just want  
2 to make sure because in this you said I have not  
3 been made any promise or been induced in any way to  
4 make this voluntary statement.

5 So you -- am I correct when I say that you  
6 were promised that this statement could not be used  
7 against you later?

8 AMOS PAGE: Yeah.

9 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Okay.

10 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: Wait a minute. I  
11 don't think you're lying.

12 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: No, no, I don't  
13 believe you're lying.

14 AMOS PAGE: I got the paper. I signed the  
15 paper. It was a --

16 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: No, I don't believe  
17 you're lying at all. I just wanted to make sure  
18 that that was out there.

19 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: From our experience  
20 with being in law enforcement, a civil attorney  
21 can't make that promise. A civil attorney dictates  
22 nothing to the district attorney's office.

23 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: The only person that  
24 can promise not to prosecute is the district  
25 attorney himself.

1 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: We're here to get --  
2 and you've given us kind of the whole climate in the  
3 city jail. Because we want to make sure when we put  
4 people in jail, which is what we do. That's our  
5 function that they're treated correctly too.

6 I mean, that's part of what we, as police  
7 officers, want to make sure. It's kind of like, if  
8 you have to take your child away from a parent, you  
9 want to make sure the child is treated fairly and  
10 taken care of. I mean, it's the same principle for  
11 us so that's why we're here talking with you.

12 That's why Sergeant Connor brought up that
